## Our American Flag...Symbol or Icon?



In today's computer and electronics driven world we have instant messaging and all kinds of 'apps', I-Phone's with 3g and 4g, service, plus I-Pad's, BlackBerry's and other odd sounding but seemingly quite necessary devices that help us stay in touch with each other.
