Elements of Justice

Your actions outside the lodge are still the actions of a Mason and should reflect as such. In this time of the internet, social media, and instant visibility, it is vital to remember that perception is reality and words can be misunderstood. The concept of social justice should already be a part of your rough stone since it promotes fair and just relations between individuals and society.

Continue to apply the tools and smooth out any rough spots in yourself and aid a reformation to your brothers if needed. Leaning back to operative masons, we are builders of things, not those who tear down or destroy. I personally take the approach of my interactions by measuring against the plumb and if the statement isn't one I would feel making in lodge or in person, I don't say it on any of those electronic forums. Let us continue to shine our lights when others are seeing darkness in these trying times and continue to focus on Friendship, Morality and Brotherly love in our daily interactions.
