## Tuckahoe History

- April 1995 - Proposed bylaw change to move Stated Meetings from first Friday to second Thursdays.
- February 1996 - Brethren were notified via radio about moving Stated Meeting
- August 1997 - Meetings were moved from first Friday to first Thursdays.
- September 1997 - Rt. Wor. Roper bought business to the lodge of paving the rear parking lot, AC system upgrades, and AC to several rooms, all before the 75th Anniversary in 1998.
- May 1998 - 75th Anniversary Celebration of Tuckahoe. Special mementos and mugs were passed out, and history of the first 75 years discussed. Grand Master Albert Tignor was in attendance (who was also a member of Tuckahoe). 125 in attendance! MW Tignor closed with his poem 'The Master's Touch'.
- 1999 - A committee of Past Masters and Brethren were formed to investigate the potential of moving to a new facility.
- 2001 - Vote was taken to put Maple Ave. building up for sale. The Bethlehem Road Masonic Temple Corporation decided to sell their building, with negotiations going on several months.
- 2002 - Tuckahoe moved into our new and current home. Extensive renovations were done on the AC, roof, and kitchen.

## Culture and History
